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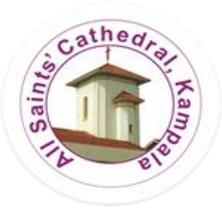

Read the full event from Luke 15:1-3, 11-32

Tax collectors and sinners came to hear Jesus preach, but the Pharisees and teachers of the law did not want Jesus associating with them.

Jesus told them a parable about a father who had two sons. The younger son went away, wasted the father's money and ended up feeding pigs. When he returned home and repented, his father welcomed him and forgave him. The older son remained home but was not happy when the younger son was welcomed with a party. The father explained that they had to celebrate because the younger brother was lost, but now he was found.

Jesus told this parable to teach that; God always lovingly welcomes sinners who repent into his kingdom, no matter how they have treated him.

The father in the story lovingly welcomed the son, who had gone away and wasted his wealth, when he genuinely repented. In the same way, God always lovingly welcomes sinners who repent into his kingdom, no matter how they

have treated him. The father also went and patiently talked to his older son who refused to join the party.

God is just like the father in the story: he loves us and wants all of us to live with him forever. He is happy and welcomes everyone who says sorry and puts their trust in Jesus, into his kingdom.
